11.Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year (maximum five bullets)		
<p>IQAC-LSR organized a one-week online certificate course on climate change education, themed "Green Teaching for Climate Action," from July 16th to 23rd, 2023. The participants included in-service and pre-service teachers, teacher educators, research scholars, and students. The course aimed to provide in-depth knowledge of climate change, promote Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) competencies, and empower participants with transformative pedagogy for affirmative action. From November 20th to 24th, 2023, IQAC-LSR, in collaboration with the Office of International Programs, hosted delegates from Macquarie University, Australia. The event centered on the theme "India and Indo-Pacific Dialogue and Contestation in the 21st Century." Activities included sessions such as "The Use and Abuse of Nature: Exploring Issues of Equity and Ecological Sustainability" by Dr. Shruti Chopra, Faculty, LSR and "Two Minutes Please!" by Ms. Akanksha Mann, Faculty, LSR On August 25th, 2023, IQAC-LSR invited Prof. Sheela Ramachandran, Pro-Chancellor of Atmiya University, to address the faculty on the topic "Academic Learning in the NEP and New Challenges in the Education System." Her talk highlighted the evolving educational landscape under the National Education Policy (NEP) and the new challenges that educators are encountering. On December 6th, 2023, IQAC-LSR conducted a workshop for non-teaching staff on "NEP 2020 and Examinations." Dr. A.K. Arora, OSD (Examinations, University of Delhi), addressed the attendees, offering valuable insights on conducting exams under the NEP framework and addressing issues related to internal assessments. In collaboration with the Department of Elementary Education, IQAC-LSR celebrated National Mathematics Day on December 22nd, 2023. The</p>		

events included a talk by Dr. T.V. Venkateshwaran, Senior Scientist at Vigyan Prasar, National Institute for Science Communication, Department of Science and Technology, Government of India, focusing on the contributions of Indian scientists in combating the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, a workshop was conducted by Dr. Jonaki Ghosh, Professor at Lady Shri Ram College, on the life and contributions of S. Ramanujan.

15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

A multidisciplinary approach has been embraced by LSR through out its past and shall continue to be embraced in the future, especially with the impetus provided by the NEP 2020. At LSR we have long understood the significance of amalgamating disciplines given its power to encourage critical thinking and foster broader world views. Incorporating perspectives from different disciplines allows students to construct multi-dimensional understandings of the issues and problems that they face as well as see in the world. LSR has 15 different departments, creating tremendous scope for collaborative work that cuts across disciplines. Departments have invited guest speakers from a variety of disciplines apart from their own. The purpose of such talks is to encourage students to look at the same issue from diverse perspectives. These talks are open to students

across college, so that students of different departments may share their views with each other. The college seeks to have a continued emphasis on inter-disciplinary research. The Mathematics Department organises the annual 'Anupama Dua Paper Presentation and Scholarship Function' during which students explore areas of Mathematics beyond the curriculum. Some departments release annual journals wherein students publish their research, for instance, the peer-reviewed 'The Learning Curve' journal published by the Psychology Department (ISSN 2321-7057). All short-term courses in LSR (on topics such as Legal Literacy and Environmental consciousness), bring together students from diverse disciplines with the singular aim of the flourishing of knowledge. Even in the coming times, the college shall support departments in selecting themes, creating itineraries, identifying speakers and designing course content (in case of short-term courses) that address different disciplines.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

LSR is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. In the regard to the Academic Bank of Credits, the College shall follow the protocol set by the University.

17.Skill development:

Skill Development is an area prioritized by LSR. This is to ensure the empowerment of students in terms of their capacity to pursue successful careers after graduation. We clearly recognize that skill development increases employability and can contribute to more inclusive national growth, particularly if offered to students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Skill development is encouraged through various mediums including interactive sessions, talks, internships, field work and workshops. Skill development at LSR has addressed soft skills (like communication), interview giving skills, CV preparation skills and data collection and data analysis skills. For example, in 2023-24 the consulting club Alpha of Statistics department conducted the workshop on Art of CV Building. Departments are encouraged to augment this focus by providing their students opportunities for skill learning, practice and implementation. For instance, students are asked to engage in practice in making presentations, writing reports, using software for data analysis, and other forms of technology. In addition, the Placement Cell of LSR plays a critical role in skill development and seeks to conduct workshops on skills such as teamwork, leadership, problem solving, initiative and enterprise, planning and organizing. Skill development efforts take place through activities within and outside the classroom. Within the classroom, activities conducted by faculty that encourage skill development may include the use of real life

examples, role plays and demonstration/practice sessions on technology use. Activities outside of the classroom include short term skill-based courses, field work under faculty supervision and internships. Students are encouraged to learn the skills of good academic writing by submitting their research papers to College publications such as the College Magazine.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Indian culture, languages and values are appreciated and celebrated at LSR through curricular and extra-curricular activities. These include values such as respect for diversity, integrity, closeness with nature, and considering the whole world as one family (Vasudheva Kutumbakham). The College is fortunate to have two dynamic departments of Indian languages- Hindi and Sanskrit. The departments seek to conduct many activities that will keep these languages at the forefront of the institution. The Hindi department conducts 'Hindi Diwas' each year and publishes a Hindi language magazine called "Dhroova". The Department of Sanskrit also publishes an academic inter-disciplinary journal called "Tejas." IQAC-LSR seeks to propel these efforts further and increase the reach of these publications, especially in the online mode. Further, the LSR College magazine includes articles from several Indian languages. The College has several societies devoted to Indian art forms including the Indian Music Society and Indian Dance society. These societies participate in all major functions of College, showcasing a multitude of regional music and dance forms (including Kathak, Odissi and Bihu). The College will continue its support to such societies and create roles for them even in academic conferences and seminars.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome-based education has been defined as an educational methodology where each aspect of education is organized around a set of goals (outcomes). It aims to create a clear expectation of results that students must achieve. The main outcomes envisioned from the teaching-learning process at LSR are (i) achieving conceptual clarity among students (ii) increasing confidence and interest in the subject of study (iii) fostering students' motivation to learn and progress (iv) developing good academic performance in assignments and university based examinations (v) preparing students for their future careers. LSR focuses on transacting the curriculum in such a manner that the teaching-learning- assessment formats allow for these outcomes to be achieved and demonstrated. To assess conceptual clarity, interest and

confidence in the subject, faculty takes feedback from students. Student inputs are also taken regarding the kind of activities that should take place in the class. In terms of student performance, there are various parameters to assess the success of the teaching-learning process. The augmentation of the college portal to collect detailed data and a formal structured system through which student performance can be tracked for at least 5 years after graduation has been created. The Placement Cell provides rich data on students' placements as well. So far, the College's performance on these parameters has been good, which provides the institution the motivation to strive for better processes leading to better outcomes. Interactive classrooms, space to clear doubts, remedial classes, use of IT tools like PowerPoint presentations, timely dissemination of readings, guidance on how to prepare for examinations are some of the techniques to ensure outcome-based education. Other forms of support that students may need to reach their goals such as grievance platforms and mental health services are also available. Maintaining a strong system of feedback from other major stakeholders - alumna, parents, institutes of collaboration and the communities we work with- is also a way to foster outcome-based education. This feedback is taken on a timely basis to devise action plans

20.Distance education/online education:

LSR is preparing for a future which is at least partly based on online education. Teachers of the college are now well versed in the use of online platforms such as Google Meet for the conduction of classes. Where required teachers can also use features such as White board. Academic events which involve large gathering are at times conducted through the Zoom application. College has also taken Premium Zoom Membership which can accomodate 1000 plus students. Faculty members are increasing their reliance on the use of ICT mediums for teaching (such as Power Point presentations and E-books). New forms of on-line assessments have also been devised, for example students recording their presentations and submitting them to the teacher in a Google folder. Previous question papers are available on the College Website for students to access.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

- LSR is a constituent college of the University of Delhi. Therefore the curricula are determined at the level of the University.
- The syllabi followed at LSR is reflective of the National Education Policy 2020, with a focus upon student-centric learning.
- LSR strives to ensure effective, time-bound coverage of curricula. Preparation of workloads, time-tables were completed before the start of the new semesters for each department.
- Classes were taken diligently throughout the year as per the time tables

- As the semester progressed, students were provided required readings. Binders containing readings were prepared and shared with students.
- Tutorials were regularly held with small groups of students.
- Certain departments teach practical courses. These were transacted among smaller groups of students to ensure more individual attention.
- Interactions with experts were held to connect students more deeply with the curricula.
- To foster access to academic e-sources, the Library provided NList passwords to students.
- Teacher-in-charges regularly met faculty members to assess if the curricula were being transacted satisfactorily. The internal assessment committee of college fixed timelines for the completion of student assessments.
- Departments prepared reports of their academic and cocurricular activities which were then collated for the College Annual Report.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

- The curricula at LSR teach students about the need to create just societies that respect human rights and seek ethical, sustainable solutions to problems.
- As an example, the Department of Psychology transacted courses such as 'Community Psychology' and 'Psychology of Disability' which allowed for engagement with themes like social justice, empowerment and community development.
- Dialogues on gender inequalities occurred as a part of programs as diverse as Philosophy, Economics and History.
- Women's contributions were strongly emphasized in classes. Students read about women scholars who contributed significantly to theories and research in their respective fields.
- The Environmental Studies course transacted with first and second year students provided them knowledge on the natural resources and the strategies needed for environmental protection, conservation of biodiversity and environmental equity.
- Professional ethics were addressed in many courses like 'Counselling Psychology' (Psychology Hons.), 'Self-Management in the Gita' (Sanskrit Hons.) and 'Ethics in the Public Domain and Bio-Ethics' (Philosophy Hons.).
- To further imbibe Ethical values a lecture with Dr. Bhaskarjit Neog, on the topic, 'Virtue Ethics in Contemporary Politics: Exploring Relevance and Application' was organised by the Department of Political Science in

February 2024.

- Discussions on texts like the Arthashastra, and Dharamashashtra, encouraged students to imbibe values such as honesty and integrity.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

- A consistent effort was made at LSR to gauge students' learning levels, with respect to the content covered in classes.
- Timely assessments allowed for teachers to assess the learning levels of students.
- Teachers took feedback on the material they taught and invited questions from students.
- The pace adopted to cover the curricula was flexible and suited to learning.
- Teachers created systems of offering additional support to students who may be struggling with academic material such as extra classes and doubt-clearing sessions.
- Cogent guidelines on attempting assignments and examinations

and reading lists were provided to the students during tutorials.

- Special importance was placed on peer mentoring to make learning inclusive.
- Measures such as bilingual lectures and the provision of reading material in Hindi, were maintained.
- High-achieving students were given opportunities for presenting research papers at conferences and publishing in credible journals under faculty supervision. The department of Sociology and Commerce organised research paper presentation competitions to encourage students' research efforts. Various departments like Mathematics, Psychology, Political Science released their annual journals in which students can publish their research work..
- LSR offered add-on courses for students wanting to expand their skill set including the Diploma programme in Conflict Transformation and Peacebuilding
- Gifted students got the opportunity to be position holders in their departments or College societies.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem

- Lectures at LSR were interwoven with debates and discussions on various course related themes and issues of contemporary significance.
- During classes, teachers kept their teaching style interactive.
- The college created engaging learning environments for students by organizing book readings, movie analyses, documentaries, workshops, and interactions with experts on various subjects. For instance, the Psychology Department hosted a screening of the documentary "Happiness Class" with Ms. Samina Mishra, a renowned filmmaker, writer, and director. Additionally, the National Service Scheme (NSS) showcased the National Geographic documentary "The History of Indian Elections," offering an in-depth look at India's electoral history.
- Peer learning and collaborative work on practical papers, research projects and class presentations were an important aspect of education.
- As a part of their course work, students of the Elementary Education department took sessions to obtain first-hand experience of teaching.
- Academic Meets on different topics also contributed to students' learning. - There has been increased use of audio and visual presentations to cover the curriculum prepared through programs like Microsoft Power Point, Google Slides and Canva. Several videos were also used to supplement teaching.
- Students were recommended different electronic data bases for academic work such as Google Scholar, N-list that can locate articles by keyword, author and title.
- In preparing their lectures, teachers gathered information from reliable websites of international organizations such as the American Psychology Association and WHO.
- Where feasible, data collection for research-based practicums shifted online. For example, students of the Psychology Department collected data from participants through Google forms and Skype interviews. They also used IT tools like Excel and SPSS to analyse quantitative data.
- Students employed emails to clarify their queries and share information with their professors.
- In terms of the ICT tools, it may be noted that along with a 24x7 wi-fi facility, the classrooms in LSR have projectors and speakers to show films and documentaries.
- The College has computer Labs for the conduction of practical classes in offline mode. The labs are updated with software like Tally, R, Matlab, Microsoft Office.

- Internal assessment guidelines were followed as advised by the University of Delhi. Assessments were taken in various forms (individual or group presentations, class tests, home assignments)
- Students were given adequate time to complete these assignments.
- Teachers were encouraged to space their assignments through the course of the semester and complete grading of assignments in a timely manner.
- The evaluation criteria were objective and transparent. Students were provided feedback that explained the reasons

for the grades received by the student.

- The Internal Assessment Committees oversaw all matters related to student assessment.
- Teachers uploaded the marks for each student on the Internal Assessment portal (Smart Prof) provided by the College. Students were informed about checking their marks on the portal. Discrepancies could be reported to the concerned teacher directly or to the department internal assessment in-charge.
 - Students could also contact their class representatives and send a list of such grievances to the teacher. The teacher checked the reported grievance and corrected it on the portal.

2.6.2 - Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

- LSR evaluated the performance of students through various methods.
- The first way of assessing outcomes was through students' responses to discussions and questions generated by teachers in their classrooms. The spontaneity and accuracy of students' answers were an effective way to gauge whether they were absorbing the course well.
- Another way of assessing these outcomes was by analysing the quality of students' performance in the assignments and practical files submitted by them and the grades received by them. The content of the assignments helped the teacher once again, to understand if the comprehension demonstrated by students was in accordance with the program and course outcomes.
- The conduct of students in classes and observations of their work ethic, indicated to teachers whether they were imbibing the learning outcome of avoiding unethical behaviours.

- A key indicator of successful outcomes was the high job placement rate for students in 2023-24. Notably, Avni Kanwal from the Economics Department secured the highest package at INR 48.9 lakhs, setting a record at the University of Delhi. The average package for the year was INR 10.55 lakhs, reflecting strong placement performance.
- Other ways of gauging outcomes were the end-of-semester examination results and students' trajectories towards higher studies. Departments kept track of the students clearing competitive exams and also obtaining admission into Masters, M. Phil and PhD programs.

LSR supports various forms of knowledge transfer: encouraging research initiatives among students and faculty, supporting department and society publications, fostering school-college collaborations, community-based projects, internships, fieldwork, and seminars. Knowledge transfer at LSR is seen as a process where academicians engage in activities to share their knowledge with varied audiences. This process is most effective when people actively seek out opportunities to collaborate, ensuring that the exchange of ideas is dynamic and productive. Through these initiatives, LSR cultivates an environment where innovation and originality thrive, benefiting both the academic community and society at large.

During 2023-2024, diligent and regular efforts were made to maintain all infrastructure on campus. This included:

- Well ventilated, bright classrooms-ICT enabled and equipped with projectors
- Separate block for tutorial classes
- Four seminar halls for events and conferences. They have audiovisual facilities and three of them have individual microphones. Each seminar hall accommodates 70 to 100 people.

- The Aung San Suu Kyi Centre for Peace inaugurated by His Holiness Dalai Lama in 2013, dedicated to the transaction of the Conflict Transformation and Peace Building Diploma course at LSR.
- The LSR Library employing the LIBSYS computerised management system.
- 24x7 Wi-Fi Facility through the University of Delhi network.
- Over 900 computers at College with Windows 10 and inbuilt antivirus and firewall.
- Three well-equipped computer labs, 4labs within the Psychology department, one lab for the Department of Elementary Education and one mass media lab for the Department of Journalism.
- The Psychology department also has a separate library and room for storing experimental apparatus.
- Accessible buildings with ramps for wheelchair access, hand rails and elevators.
- Washrooms for students with disabilities
- Reserved parking spot for teachers with disability in the College parking lot.
- 67 fire extinguishers and 28 fire hydrants.
- Attempts were made to maintain digital infrastructure, for example by updating features of the Smart Prof portal, and continued access to Google Meet and Zoom platform for online sessions.

- Various facilities for Sports such as athletics track, a tennis court, a badminton court, volleyball and basketball courts, table-tennis facilities, shooting range, chess tables, gymnastics mattresses and other apparatus.

- Outdoor exercise equipment including bars for workouts.

The financial well-being of LSR was reviewed by the Principal and the Treasurer periodically & the Governing Body studied the audited statement for the same. An Internal audit took place continuously as part of every financial transaction, through the Bursar and Section Officer of Accounts, Principal and Vice-Principal.

For any new projects or activities initiated, funding from college was sought, (other than those from the main grant sanctioned by UGC). A detailed proposal had to be submitted by teachers and students involved. The Purchase & Finance committees meticulously discussed the necessity of the proposed expenditure. In case the proposal was passed, a final sanction was sought from the Principal.

Then all expenses were carefully monitored. Timely submission of bills was a prerequisite for the release of any money. All procurement was done through the Government-e Marketplace (GeM).

The College conduct the internal financial audits on periodically basis and external financial audit are carried out annually for preparation of Audit Account and Balance Sheet, further an external agency CAG (Comptroller & Auditor General of India) audited & conducted audit upto financial year 2021-22. The observations made by internal or external auditors are compiled withing rules and a proper action initiated as per the observation.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

LSR comes under the extended college scheme of UGC according to which financial assistance (of 95%) is provided through UGC grants for up to 1000 students. As mandated, the Shri Ram Educational trust contributed towards the finances of the remaining 5% of students. Efficient allocation and optimal utilisation of funds was ensured through the diligence of the Governing Body, Principal, Vice-principal, Bursar, Accounts section, Finance committee and purchase committee. The major sources of receipts/funding are as follows: Grant from University Grants Commission, Grants from the University of Delhi, Fees from students enrolled in LSR, Donations. The deficit was met by the Governing Board/Governing Trust of the college. Funds were utilised for updating wi-Fi facilities, which in turn has enabled the digitisation of the Library and Administrative section of LSR. Technological upgradation particularly benefited teachers, students since the outbreak of the pandemic by ensuring that all the services of College could continue in online mode.

Every financial transaction was permitted only after due procedures were followed and the final sanction was granted by the Principal.

The utilisation of these funds was ensured through financial auditing. Only authorized persons could operate transactions through the bank. The accounts were done by Tally Software.

- LSR successfully underwent the first NAAC cycle in April 2016 and received A Grade.
- It successfully underwent the second NAAC cycle in 2022 and received A++ Grade.
- LSR has been in the process of implementing the feedback from NAAC received in a considerable way.
- In addition, LSR has an active IQAC cell. Maintaining quality standards are part of all college procedures.
- Several extension activities are in place especially through NCC and NSS -LSR and other societies.
- At LSR, the teaching-learning processes are reviewed in two specific ways.
- The first process is taking feedback annually from students. Feedback forms are designed by Departments. Currently departments collect their feedback through online mechanisms such as Google forms. The plant collects waste water from the administrative, academic and hostel blocks and the water is recycled back to usable form. This water is then used for purposes such as watering plants, gardens and flushing toilets.

E-waste Management: Regarding E-waste management, the College donates non-functional laptops and USB cables to an NGO that dispose of it adequately. Batteries that are exhausted are exchanged for new ones on the GeM platform on a buyback basis. College will continue to follow all government guidelines for the disposal of E-waste.

Biomedical waste, Hazardous chemicals and radioactive waste management- These types of waste management do not take place at LSR, as of now, given that the College does not have any department that uses chemicals or other hazardous material.
